A Forest Conscienceness is a unique theme taken from a paper presented by C E Lane Poole, a controversial Western Australian Conservator of Forests, who fought many battles to formulate the W A Forests Act (1918).

This conference will be held near one of the first karri forests that he visited and wrote wisely and humourously about in his diaries of that time.

The Australian Forest History Society was formed in 1988 and has members in Australia, New Zealand, and the USA.

The aim of the society is to advance historical understanding of human interactions with Australian forest and woodland environments.

The Society has held five national conferences and this is the first time the event has been held in Western Australia.

Augusta - Western Australia

Just south of the wine-growing region of Margaret River lies Augusta. Situated at the mouth of the Blackwood River, where the river merges into the Southern Ocean, this historic town is the State's third oldest settlement.

The Augusta Hotel/Motel

The venue for our conference overlooks the magnificent Blackwood River Estuary, an everchanging panorama of watercraft, weather and wildlife. Exceptional speakers, combined with an abundance of natural beauty, will guarantee a stimulating event.

The hotel environs contain a range of comfortable accommodation from river-view rooms to family cottages and backpacker facilities.

The Trip to Augusta

The 320 kms coach trip will be a day of interest and variety as we pass by forests, farms and vineyards. An historical rail museum and workshops will be a highlight of the trip South.

Technical sessions will combine with field excursions to provide a complete forest history experience. These include a ferry trip on the Blackwood River; a visit to the beautiful Boranup re-growth karri forest and wineries of the region; the old sawmill sites at Karridale, Boranup and Witchcliffe and sailing ship timber ports at Flinders and Hamelin Bay.

Local identities with knowledge of forest history will entertain delegates. Native flora and fauna and the chance of seeing whales and dolphins in the bay will be of additional interest.

The Technical Program

The Forests of the West

Western Australia is noted for the hardwood forests of the South West and has a history of human association with the forest that goes back to the early days of white settlement and beyond into indigenous history. This sturdy hardwood has been used around the world and the beauty of the tall white karri forests are a major scenic attraction. The south-west corner of the state is also renowned for its flora and fauna.

Conference Theme

"A Forest Conscienceness"

This intriguing concept is taken from a paper presented by C E Lane Poole (West Australian Conservator of Forests 1916-1921) in which he stated 'but when the people develop a forest conscienceness the position will be entirely altered'.

Two major strands will be explored in the four symposia to acknowledge -

- (a) an awareness of the economic and aesthetic value of forests and
- (b) the social and ethical responsibility of wise management.

Speakers

An impressive array of Western Australian and national authors will present papers. Additionally, contributions have been received from the United States, New Zealand, Korea and Canada.

Traditionally, forest history meetings have covered a wide range of opinions and experience and this depth of material augurs well for a stimulating conference. Invited addresses, after dinner speakers and local identities will enliven the event.

Over 60 abstracts have been submitted covering such diverse topics as -

"The Management of Korean forests under Japanese occupation in WWII".

"The use of colonial art to reconstruct pre-European forests in Australia and New Zealand".

"The role of sustenance workers in forest rehabilitation during the depression years in Western Australia".

The Proceedings

All authors who submitted abstracts will be notified in early April of the decision on their papers and procedures for preparing and submitting a full version for the proceedings.

All papers accepted for presentation will, if submitted in writing by the due date, be considered for publication in the Proceedings. Authors may choose to have the paper peer-reviewed, in which case publication in the reviewed section of the Proceedings is conditional on acceptance following review.

Alternatively, authors may submit their papers for publication in the un-reviewed section of the proceedings. Acceptance of such papers is at the editors' discretion and some conditions may apply.

Field Excursions

Monday 13 September

The first boat-load of settlers arrived in Augusta in 1830 - just one year after the Swan River colony was established. From then on, the history of this area and its hardwood forests are entwined. This afternoon excursion will explore picturesque Augusta, Cape Leeuwin (the most southwesterly tip of Australia) and the beautiful Blackwood River.

Wednesday 15 September

This full day excursion will further explore the history and beauty of the area. Highlights will include a visit to Hamelin Bay, early port for the timber industry; the Boranup Forest with its magnificent Karri (trees are waiting to be hugged); an exceptional fine wood-work gallery, plus amazing stories to bring the past to life.

Other Highlights of Augusta

For Accompanying Guests and those who decide to stay longer in the region, there is much to enjoy. Visit Augusta's Historical Museum; walk part of the Augusta Busselton Heritage Trail; enjoy the underground beauty of Jewel Cave; take a whale watching cruise; climb Hillview Lookout for a panoramic 360 degree view or visit the renowned vineyards of the Margaret River region.

The Augusta Visitor Centre (a short walk up Blackwood Avenue).
